Preliminary Results

- Research on anticipatory governance and foresight embed both critical and instrumentalist perspectives to engaging with the future and the impact on the present
- Methods with instrumentalist perspectives like climate models are mentioned more often in policies than participatory foresight methods in policies, and are considered less political











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
